President's Message

First of all, I would like to take this opportunity to wish everyone in our community a very happy and successful New Year.

The Ad Hoc Committee on Governing Documents, created by the Board of Directors, met for the first time on Monday, December 8. They have been tasked with completing a review of the restated CC&Rs and Bylaws. They plan to have their review ready for the Board to take up at the January Board Meeting. Few modifications to the documents that have previously been sent to the entire community are anticipated.

Once the CC&Rs and Bylaws are finished, the committee will move on to the Rules & Regulations. They will keep the Board and, in turn, the community updated as they progress.

It is critical that we adopt new governing documents that reflect that we are now a homeowner-run community while maintaining legal compliance and property values. Your YES vote matters – and remember that we need 515 YES votes to put these documents to bed.

For those of you that missed the last Board meeting, 'The Aged to Perfection' Wine Club has been reinstated and you should have received an e-mail regarding how to join if you are a wine lover. Within 2 days of the notice going to residents, over 100 residents had already joined. We all look forward to the first event on January 31.

Also, I would like to let the community know that there was a lot of damage to the common areas from the last storm and they are being fixed as fast as possible. To avoid additional expense to make the repairs, the usual monthly cycle for landscaping will be extended to every 8 or 9 weeks until the repairs are complete within the next few months.

Finally, the Board is working on our 2026 goals, which should be ready to share with the community by the end of January. Also, we will be taking into consideration all the requests from residents from 2025, together with 2025 goals that were not completed in 2025.







DESIGN REVIEW COMMITTEE (DRC)

As the holiday season passes yet again, here are a few practical reminders as we begin the new year:

1. Check / change your HVAC air filters. Depending on your model, you may have several (great room, primary bedroom, utility hall just inside the garage door).
2. Flush your tankless water heater with vinegar per the manufacturer's instructions.
3. Change the water filter in your refrigerator (if it has one).
4. Replace the batteries in your smoke / CO detectors.
5. Clean out your dryer vent.
6. Clean out your dishwasher filter (It's usually under the bottom tray. It twists out.).
7. Make sure all your landscape drains are clear in preparation for the next rain.
8. Check your outside garage lights at night. Replace any burned out lamps. If they still don't come on, you may need a new photocell. Did you know you can also leave your front / back porch and side garage lights always on too? They work on the photocell so they automatically go off during the day.

You can handle any of these items yourself or have one of our resident handymen take care of them for you. Regular maintenance can significantly extend the life of these items and make your life much better.

Happy New Year! Remember, we live where other people come for vacation!

Committee Updates This Month

Financial Advisory Committee (FAC)

As we approached year end, the Finance Advisory Committee (FAC) focused on minimizing potential tax liabilities resulting from Unrelated Business Income (UBI). The association generates this type of income primarily from reserve and excess operating funds invested in interest bearing accounts. Additionally, the first tranche of the Spectrum bulk cable / internet payment (Door fee) was received in December. Consequently, the FAC recommended to the board that any value added special projects that the association could make substantial progress or complete prior to year end would be tax advantageous. These projects include:

- Beginning the maintenance yard construction sequestered behind the tennis courts, all of which is paid for by the Spectrum bulk cable / internet door fee
- Installation of identified safety and security lighting
- Hardscape work outside of the front gates along Del Webb Way and Dinah Shore

In addition, many thanks to committee member, Mitch Spike, for his past work and for extending his committee appointment going forward in 2026.

Joining Mitch and me are new committee members Evan Roklen and Mike Gialdini. I look forward to working with Mitch, Evan, Mike and new HOA Board liaison, James Lee-Lopez, in the year ahead. I have also interviewed and recommended our committee's final member to the board. Board action on this candidate is expected at the January HOA meeting.

SAC's first order of business in 2026 will be to set our goals and priorities for new year. One of those priorities will be a traffic engineering review of a number of intersections without stop or yield signs. We will update you when other goals/priorities are determined.

Winter reminder:

With the Vegetation rule approved and enforceable the Standards Committee is pleased to announce that the majority of the DWRM residents are complying with the new rule. Thank You.

VEGETATION RULE:

"Owners who plant shrubs, hedges, vines or any other vegetation, adjacent to any wall, (including a low pony wall) that abuts any Association or Owner property, may grow the shrubs, hedges, vines or any other vegetation to a height not to exceed one (1) foot above the vertical height of that Owner's tallest perimeter (block) wall. This height restriction does not pertain to trees, cacti, ocotillo, agave or Yucca"

"Intrusion onto the Association's property: Owners who plant trees, shrubs, hedges, vines or any other vegetation, adjacent to any perimeter (block) wall or perimeter pony wall that abuts any Association property, shall not allow the trees, shrubs, hedges, vines or any other vegetation to extend past the vertical plane of the wall as viewed from the Association's side of the wall (aka: past the Association's side of the wall and onto Association property). This restriction includes, but is not limited to, limbs, branches, trunks and leaves or any other part of trees, shrubs, hedges, vines or any other vegetation, authorized in the Plant Plan Palette (aka: Approved Plant List) of these Design Guidelines and are also on the Owner's approved Plans and Specifications. Any unauthorized and / or unapproved vegetation must be removed. "

"Sight lines and walkway obstructions: Trees, shrubs, hedges, vines or any other vegetation, must not obstruct the sight lines for pedestrians, cyclists or vehicles utilizing Association streets. Vegetation must be maintained to ensure site line visibility at all street comers and intersections."

"Owner's trees, shrubs, hedges, vines or any other vegetation, shall not protrude onto Association property including walkways, trails, paths, streets and curbs. "

"An unobstructed view of the front of any residence including, but not limited to, house address, carriage lights and entryway, must be maintained."

"Any unauthorized and/or unapproved vegetation not authorized in the Plant Plan Palette (aka: Approved Plant List) of these Design Guidelines and also on the Owner's approved Plans and Specifications must be removed."

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January 2026:

Del Webb Community canvassing is focused on overgrown trees and weeds. Overgrown trees are easily identified on foot or as one drives the streets of our community. Weeds are back due to our heavy rains and are easily identified.

*****DWRM landscaping contractor Southwest is recommending now is the time to trim/lace residential trees. Trees halt their growth in fall, enter a state of dormancy through the winter. This activity along with dropping temperatures creates a ideal time for pruning /trimming/lacing trees.

Resident Trees are to be maintained within the property lines not to extend over neighbors or community common areas.

A method of pruning that is used to maintain trees shape and health is lacing.

Tree lacing is a pruning technique that involves removing branches to improve a tree's health, safety and appearance. Benefits of tree lacing.....Light and Air, Pest control, Safety, Aesthetics and Nutrient Distribution, Tree lacing is a precise process that can take longer than standard trimming. And in most cases is done by a professional landscaper.

Due to the heavy downpour last month, EROSON is back. Please check your property for signs of erosion. CSC will be canvassing in January looking to identify all erosion non-compliance. Remember to check your side yards.

LANDSCAPE COMMITTEE

Looking back at 2025, there were numerous landscape projects completed, as well as other accomplishments, which are listed below. With 74.5 acres of common area to maintain, plant and tree replacement is a priority. Many of our common areas are being converted to stone versus what was previously DG and have turned into sand. This will reduce maintenance costs, reduce sand buildup and is more aesthetically pleasing.

- The landscape maintenance contract was bid-out, resulting in a new all-inclusive contract including tree maintenance, palm tree maintenance and putting green maintenance, which were all separate line items in 2025, representing budgeted savings of \$66,366.00.
- The overall landscape budget for 2026 was reduced by \$95,532.00 without the loss of any services over the 2025 budget.
- The area in front of the fountain at the main entrance was completely relandscaped. The purpose of the renovation was to highlight and showcase the beautiful fountain which has been hidden by the landscaping originally planted by Pulte's landscaper, in addition to replacing dead or missing plants and adding stone.
- Approximately 2600 plants were replaced throughout the community, 590 of those plants came from the HOA nursery at no cost. Given the cost of purchased plants in 2025, that represents a savings of \$17,055.00.
- 32 trees were replaced
- Stone was added to:
 - 9 medians off Del Webb Way.
 - the medians both on the inside and outside of the Magnum gate, compliments of **Southwest**

Landscaping at no cost to the HOA

- the long center median at the Los Alamos gate.
- the two center medians in front of the clubhouse.
- the east, west and center medians at the main entrance (in progress)
- Approved in 2025, but pending the installation of lighting, the area in front of the clubhouse and Del Webb Rancho Mirage signs on the corner of Del Webb Way and Vineyard will be relandscaped with new plants and stone.
- The approval and start of the Landscape Maintenance Yard, which will provide storage for our landscaper, the HOA, and the EPAC committee. It will also result in no equipment or the trailer used by Southwest to remain in our parking lot and provide the landscapers with a break area.

EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS ADVISORY COMMITTEE (EPAC)

Happy New Year to all Del Webb neighbors! The EPAC committee looks forward to a year of helping our neighbors become personally prepared and resilient against the natural and man-made disasters we face as a community living in Earthquake Country.

By now, many of you may have attended or are planning to host a neighborhood block party featuring disaster preparedness games and prizes. If you would like to host a party, please contact EPAC to see if your Block is available and to get a free Kit. (You provide the venue and refreshments.) Have lots of fun while getting to know more neighbors. This is key to making Del Webb safer and able to recover more quickly and fully from a disaster.

Let's make some New Year's Resolutions:

1. Download and read the DWRM Emergency Preparedness and Response Plan. For EPAC to be effective, we need everyone to be aware, prepared, and responsible. You can access a copy and download it from the DWRMHOA.com website under Committees/EPAC.
2. Replenish your stored fresh water. FEMA recommends 2 gallons per day per person for 14 days = 28 gallons.
3. Replenish your favorite non-perishable foods to have enough to eat without going to the store for 2 weeks.
4. Know the signs of a gas leak, have the tool necessary to turn off the gas. Never turn gas back on yourself, it requires a professional to insure the house is clear of gas prior to turning it back on. Contact EPAC to help you.
5. Know how to turn off your water in the 3 locations. Contact EPAC to help you.
6. Check your 'Go Bag' supplies and rotate them, for example, medications, with a 2-week fresh supply.
7. Purchase new AA and AAA batteries for your flashlights and portable devices.
8. Re-charge your battery storage devices.

Some tips:

1. Take your Fire Extinguishers and turn them upside down and shake them to loosen the powder inside.
2. Test your Smoke Detectors and Carbon Monoxide Detectors. If you cannot climb a ladder, ask a neighbor to help you. Don't set yourself up for a fall.
3. Change your HVAC filters -- you have 3 of them. Ask a neighbor to help you if you cannot climb a ladder.
4. Replenish your stash of small bills (ones and fives)
5. Never leave the room with your range top burners ignited. Procure a fire blanket and keep one near the range top.
6. Keep your dryer vent and exhaust free of lint.




